Health & Wellbeing

Activity at Moulton Community Centre continues apace, and the tempo increased over the summer school break.

At the Wellbeing Hub we are committed to ensuring that we provide care and support when and where needed. The Hub offers the opportunity for local residents to connect with each other and beyond. Most of all, our Moulton community (all 7,000 of us), has somewhere to gather and enjoy facilities and activities to suit all ages. Each morning, a breakfast trolley is laid out with fruit, pastries and cereal for people to help themselves – no questions asked! Snacks are also available throughout the day. Still on the subject of food, Moulton Community Larder continues to be well used and has now grown to two sessions each week – Wednesday 5.45pm and Thursday 10.00am.

The Wellbeing Hub has introduced the Community Together Scheme, designed to assist Pupil Premium families and individuals and families facing temporary or ongoing hardship. Come along to our Community Library and let us help where it is most needed.


Council Stuff

You may have come across the Boundary Commission proposal to incorporate Moulton Leys into our parish. There are widely different views regarding whether this should, or should not, happen. Moulton Parish Council believe it is the right way forward. However, we know that some Moulton Leys residents take the opposite view. In the end, all Moulton Leys residents have the final say so "que sera, sera" ("what will be, will be").

Normally, the life expectancy of a Parish Council is 4 years. However, as a result of Northamptonshire reorganisation into two Unitary Authorities (WNC & NNC), our re-election date was delayed from 2022 to 2025. So, MPC has been able to use the extra time to develop its services and facilities in this more stable extended period.

May 2025 will bring us to the end of this Parish Council and the start of the next. We have 14 members of the Council. At this stage, who will wish to remain, and who might not, is unknown. What is important is that it continues to strive in the best interests of our Moulton Parish community. We have a beautiful village centre and Conservation Area but must remember that by far the larger number of residents live in the surrounding areas. Balancing the needs of both will always be a challenge!

All of our councillors have the wellbeing of our community of Moulton at heart. If you believe you can offer your skills, experience and enthusiasm to support our community, please consider putting yourself forward for election in May.





THE BOB EADY TRUST

When my husband and I moved to the village in 2016, we never thought that there was a family connection to Moulton. When I started to create a family tree for my step-children, I discovered that three of their great, great grandparents were born here and I came across names and places that I recognised, including Alibone, Jeyes, High Street, The Shoulder of Mutton and Dove's Lane. Having seen mention of the Bob Eady Trust photo collection in the Moulton Scene, I decided to visit the Community Centre to see if I could find any pictures that I could add to the family tree. Little did I know then that this would turn out to be a long job!

I discovered that the Bob Eady Trust collection is massive; there are around 20 large stacks and store boxes and 12 filing cabinet drawers containing, amongst other things, historical records, photographs and newspaper cuttings. To find something specific requires hours of searching.

Having shown an interest in the collection, I was asked if I would like to sort through the collection and reorganise it to make it easier for people like me to search. Prior to the pandemic, many volunteers had begun to collate the materials into order but, with lots of new donations, the additions needed to be incorporated into the collection. As I love history and like a challenge, I agreed and roped in my other half and a few more willing volunteers to help. A few months on and we are still sifting through the boxes, and it will be a while longer until we have the contents organised.

In the meantime, I would like to share with you my favourite discovery so far.

Up until 1837, Moulton had a workhouse which Bob Eady's research identified as Waterloo House, the lovely property you can see between the Church and the Artichoke. When the Brixworth Union workhouse was opened, residents were transferred there and any remaining contents were put up for auction.



The auction included an old bedstead and coffer (chest) which used to belong to an old lady who died in the workhouse. Her nearest of kin had been asked to contribute towards her interment, but had declined, so she was buried at the cost of the parish and her humble possessions remained in the workhouse.

The effort has excited a great deal of curious and general in the village, but the body purchase retains your accident of his bargain and its contents.

As you can see from this short newspaper report from July 1837, the coffer was bought for two shillings and nine pence by John Ward, a labourer from the village. What a bargain he got! Another report from the Northampton Mercury gives more detail about his find; the gold coins were from the reign of James I (1603 - 1625, the King Guy Fawkes tried to blow up), Charles II (1660 - 1685), James II (1685 - 1688, grandfather of Bonnie Prince Charlie) and William and Mary (1688 - 1702). It must have been like winning the lottery today. I would love to know how much the coins were worth and what John Ward did with the money. Did he stay in Moulton? If you have John Ward in your family tree and can shed more information on the future of the family, I would love to hear from you.

Once cleared, the former workhouse was offered for rent.



I will let you know how we are getting on in the next issue of the Moulton Scene.

Water Safety and Urban Drainage in Moulton

Water may look picturesque and inviting, especially on a hot sunny day, but public water courses and SuDS are dangerous and should never be used to play in!

Sites of water in Moulton

Water Courses

SuDS – what are they?

SuDS stands for Sustainable Drainage Systems. They are designed to manage stormwater, mimic natural drainage and reduce flooding and pollution.

They may be filled with water, similar to a pond or maybe look like a dry basin. They often contain reeds and other plants to help with natural drainage, pollution and to help you escape if you fall in.



Don't be fooled if they look dry – you should never play in a SuDS basin!

Top Tips - To Stay Safe Near Water

- Go together!
- Take notice of safety information and warning signs.
- Young children should always be supervised by an adult.
- Water can be colder than you expect and can cause your body to go into shock, this will affect your ability to swim, look after yourself, or rescue others. This is a key reason why many people drown.
- Learn how to swim and get trained in lifesaving and resuscitation techniques.
- You may be able to help yourself and others if you know what to do in an emergency.

NEVER enter the water to save others, look for something you can throw to help them float, a football might help, keep watching until help arrives.

In 2023, Kate Stamp took part in memory of her friend Rachel who was a patient at the hospice. She said: "My friend Rachel passed away a couple of years ago from cancer and she was at Cynthia Spencer Hospice. Events like this are a good thing to do to give back."

"I was really nervous at the beginning because I was on my own and I didn't have any supporters, but the atmosphere was amazing, and everyone was cheering us on."

Participants can pick the distance they travel to match their ability and supporters can also get involved in the family-friendly activities at Lamport Hall.

We hope that the local community will support this fantastic fundraiser.



MOULTON PLAYERS/MOULTON THEATRE

Moulton Players started in 1946 – to raise funds for a good cause! In February of that year, a group met at a house in Moulton, with the aim of enjoying acting and using the profits (and the interval raffle!) to pay for beds in the Manfield Orthopaedic Hospital for injured servicemen. The first play was '3 Half-Crowns' (the cost then of a marriage licence!) and took place in the Manfield Hall (now the Evangelical Church). Production dates were dependant on the Welfare Clinic, as mums and babies could not negotiate the extension which had to be made to the stage! The extension came down after the last night and Tom, the caretaker, supplied refreshments for the workers, in the shape of his home brew!

In 1947, the money raised was for a meal and entertainment for Moulton War widows and widowers. In subsequent years, the tradition of putting on a concert and a meal at Christmas for local pensioners continued until the early 70's and became known as the 'Old Folks' Show'! Amazingly, 300 cigarettes were provided by the village doctor! (In those days, a good meal was a treat for many older people.) The concerts were great fun to be in and to rehearse and were a mix of singing, dancing and comedy sketches. Times changed and until the 80's, when it all ceased, sherry and mince pies were served at the concert instead of the meal.

In 1992, a chicken barn at the Manor House was converted by the Players into the Barn Theatre. A portable building was eventually purchased to provide a social and rehearsal area and then a lighting box was added. The number, scope and quality of productions increased, a Youth Group was formed and the Players qualified for membership of the Little Theatre Guild of Great Britain. Many one-act play festivals were entered with some success. When the Manor House estate changed hands, the Players were homeless and plays took place at Moulton School. Then, the 19th century former Methodist Church became redundant, and the Players purchased it and its adjacent cottages in 1992 for £25,000. Then followed a long battle involving listed building laws. Thanks to a £60,000 National Lottery grant, fund-raising and donations, the first production in the new Theatre, 'Tom Jones' by Henry Fielding, was presented in October 2004. A great deal of the building work was undertaken by skilled members of the Players and, as it was a listed building in a Conservation Area, certain elements of the old church had to be incorporated, such as the moulding round the bar and the pulpit, which is now the Box Office.

The Theatre has gone from strength to strength since then and it is probably the only purpose-built amateur theatre in our district and is well known throughout the County. The Saturday coffee mornings are open to the village people, who support the plays and film seasons with enthusiasm.

The Theatre now hosts regular coffee mornings on a Saturday, and we would love to see you at these. Just come along and meet friends and local community members... a warm welcome awaits you......

Plans are in place for a Youth Group to be established. There are a number of social events for Members of Moulton Theatre. So please join the Theatre and join YOUR local Theatre.

MOULTON ALLOTMENTS



Moulton Allotments is situated off Rose Tree Close on the western edge of the village overlooking Moulton College farmland and encourages the cultivation and enjoyment of allotments by anyone in the local community. Currently we have 112 full plots, 4 half plots, 24 raised beds and several polytunnels, all of which are available at a low rental cost. We can therefore cater for anyone, from someone who wants to grow just a few flowers or vegetables to families who want to grow as much of their own food as possible, including wheelchair users.

Until the Covid disrupted everyone's lives, we had two successful clubs for younger allotmenteers: the Junior Growers for 10s and under and the Crafty Growers for 11s and over. We also have two wildlife areas, including three ponds that host wild flora and fauna, including crested newts, and great care has been taken to provide food and habitat for insects and birds. These provide fabulous peaceful areas to sit and absorb nature.





Obituaries



Charles Edmund ALIBONE was born on 4th February 1933 to Fred (a bricklayer) and Lucy at 11 Overstone Road. In 1938 the family moved next door to No.10. Chas passed the 11+ in 1944 but he almost failed to get to the Grammar School as his mother

told him they could not afford the necessary trousers. However, his aunts combined their wartime ration coupons and he was able to have the necessary uniform. As a boy he was a member of Moulton Church Choir, the Church Lads Brigade and the Army Cadet Force.

On leaving school in 1949 he took an apprenticeship with A.R & W Cleaver (building materials) where he gained 2nd place in a UK-wide Building Industries Diploma exam. He had to leave Cleavers in 1951 to do his National Service in the Royal Engineers. He was based at Aldershot and Crickhowell in the Brecon Beacons, where he learnt to sail – then completed his apprenticeship with Cleavers. He and Janet married in Moulton Church in 1956, having met, aged 11, on the school bus and became childhood sweethearts. They went on to celebrate 67 years of marriage.

Chas got a job as a Sales Rep. selling specialist ironmongery for historic buildings, which necessitated a move to Cambridge where Timothy and then Sarah were born. In September 1968 the family moved to Northampton so that Chas could attend a full-time teacher training course at the University of Leicester. His first teaching post was at Headlands School and his final job was at Fairfields Special Needs School, where he stayed until retirement in 1992, having moved back to Moulton in Ashley Lane.

At Fairfields, he took the children on Outward Bound activities and was instrumental in securing a very large donation, enough to build a school garden which he designed to meet the needs of disabled children – this allowed them to experience and enjoy gardening – something which made him very proud.

Chas loved Moulton, its history and its people. He was a great and entertaining storyteller and also wrote down many in his memoirs – he was a great asset to the History Society. He loved nature, especially bird life and gardening – they were both members of Moulton Gardeners Society. Chas kept chickens and bees and was a member of the Beekeepers Association, keeping his hives in the oil seed rape fields at Sandy Hill Farm and on the Holcot Road. He used his building skills to extend the bungalow and even built a sailing dinghy. Chas and Janet had a long and happy marriage, and although deeply rooted in Moulton and Northamptonshire, they visited many countries overseas – their adventures providing more entertaining stories!

Chas was an unforgettable character – a hoarder of anything that might 'come in handy' – with a garage to prove it! His health began to decline a few years ago – cancer and heart issues reduced his mobility, which was difficult – his final days were spent at home, as they both wished, with the help of family and a team of carers. He sadly died in November. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him and especially by Janet, Tim, Sarah, sisters Phillis and Iris and grandchildren, Huw and Elin.

Michael ANDREWS (Mike) died on 5th June 2023 after a short illness. He was born in 1947 in Sheffield, spending school holidays on a mixed farm on the borders of the Derbyshire countryside, where his love of agriculture and horticulture started. Having spent a year working on a farm with cows and sheep, in 1966 he went to the Royal Agricultural College in



Cirencester for 2 years. Mike and Jan married in 1969 and had 2 children, Vicki in 1974 and James in 1977. Firstly, they had a pig farm in Lincolnshire, then Mike got a job at Bishop Burton Agricultural College near Beverly, then they moved to Selby in Yorkshire before moving to a village nearer Beverly. In 1991 they moved to Moulton, Mike having a job at Moulton College. They lived in the grounds for a year before moving to Church View, where they lived for 28 years. Mike became Deputy Vice-Principal and was instrumental in obtaining grant funding which enabled expansion of the College.

On his retirement from the College, Mike took an allotment plot at Moulton Allotments and joined the Committee. The allotments were run by the Parish Council at that time, and it was not possible for the Council to apply for grants. In 2016 Mike played a massive part in helping to form Moulton Allotments CIC, a non-profit Community Interest Company, enabling grant applications. Mike, as one of the directors of the company, was also an excellent Company Secretary and Treasurer. There were many areas he helped to create around the allotments, including the plot holders 'raised beds' area, the 'we feed' area and the 'Junior Growers' area, which he successfully ran for two years until the Covid pandemic stopped it.

As well as devoting much of his time to the allotments, Mike helped his son James to refurbish properties in Wales and Somerset. He also enjoyed spending time with his grandchildren. During the Covid lockdown, Mike and Jan decided to downsize from a house to a bungalow in Narborough, Leicestershire to be nearer to daughter Vicki and family, where Jan still lives. He is much missed by all who knew him.

Justin CARLIN was born on 9th June 1974 and sadly passed away suddenly at the age of 49 in February 2024 whilst on holiday in Spain with his wife Jo, and friends.

Justin grew up in London where he met his wife, Jo, and moved to Northampton in 2010. In 2015, himself, his wife and

four children moved to Moulton and it was to be their forever home as he loved living in Moulton so much - he would often say it was the best move he had ever made.

Moving to Moulton he was welcomed with open arms by the villagers due to his fun-loving nature and kindness. He loved socialising and made many friends in the village in a short time after moving here.

His career started in London for a plumbing and heating company and on his move to Northampton, he wanted to go self-employed, which he did in 2010. He then started up what was to become a successful plumbing and heating business, which he was highly passionate about.

He was such a kind man and during Covid would help people by dropping items off to them if they couldn't leave their homes due to isolation.

In December 2023, he decided to reach out to local lonely people at Christmas and delivered Christmas hampers to them and spent time with them chatting and giving them some company.

He had a larger-than-life outlook and always had a beaming smile on his face and was always fun to be around.

Justin will be sadly missed by his family and friends.

Pamela EASTAFF passed away in January 2024 aged 97 years at Duncote Care Home near Towcester. She is survived by her beloved husband Jack aged 101.

Pam was born in Chesterfield in 1926 to parents Arthur and Lily Pickbourne. Her close sister Shirley also passed away aged 93 years in 2023. Pam lived and went to

school in five places: Nottingham, Hastings, Salisbury, Northampton and during the second world war in Bournemouth, where school was part-time, mornings one week, afternoons the next, just 3 days per week. She left school at 14 and worked for the war office at the requisitioned Grand Hotel in Bournemouth as a filing clerk. She was a clever and brilliant administrator, bookkeeping and accounting most of her life for local businesses and in retirement for the Daventry Friends of Iganga.

Ross was a wonderful wife to Pete and wonderful mum to Karl and Nicola, lovely nan and great nan to all her grandchildren. Ross sadly passed away on February 9th 2024. She will be missed but will never be forgotten. All the memories we have with her will stay in our hearts forever and always.

John William FLETCHER was born in 1924 in Nuneaton, and died in March 2024, having lived in Ashley Lane since 1959. He started work at the Post Office when he was 14 years old, and continued to work for the same employer, other than a gap during war time, until he retired in 1984. His first job was delivering telegrams, cycling for



miles around Nuneaton and Coventry, often at night, and sometimes delivering sad news during the early years of the war.

In 1942 he volunteered for the Navy and joined the Fleet Air Arm as a radio mechanic. He went to college in Aberdeen and had various postings in Scotland, Northern Ireland and England. He worked on radar equipment for aircraft on service in the Atlantic and later on submarine detection.

He returned to civilian life in 1947 and rejoined Nuneaton Post Office as a sorting clerk and telegraphist. In 1950 he met Alice at a music group and in 1952 they married. 3 years later Nick was born and then Joanna, and Andrew several years later. He became a lecturer at the PO Training College in Birmingham. In 1959 he accepted a move to Northampton PO and he and his family moved to Moulton. He was promoted to superintendent, then assistant head postmaster.

He loved living in Moulton and soon became very involved with various organisations in the community. He was elected to the Parish Council in 1963 and remained a councillor for over 50 years, with 3 stints as chairman. One of his proudest achievements was helping to save The Crowfields as an open space for the village for recreational use.

He was a governor at Moulton Primary and Secondary Schools, and chairman of governors at the Primary School for many years.

He was chairman and committee member of the Moulton Players, and even acted sometimes, usually playing himself! He played a big part in relocating the Players to their current home in Cross Street. He was the biggest supporter of Alice who was an actor and producer with the Players.

In 1975 he was proud to be selected as a magistrate in Northamptonshire and served until he was 72yrs. For the last 2 years he worked in the Crown Court as a judge/magistrate. After retiring from the Post Office, he became County Director of the St John's Ambulance Association.

In the few years before he retired, he and colleagues formed a Twinning Association at Northampton PO with Poitiers, Marburg and Coimbra. He and Alice made many friends through their visits to these towns, and this became a big part of their lives after he retired.

During his nearly 40 years of retirement John continued to play a big part in village life with the Parish Council, the History Society and the Players in particular. He loved spending time with his family who he gave so much love to, and we will greatly miss him.

Elizabeth Lillian Betty Swain (Betty HIGHAM) was born on 22nd May 1927 in Yardley Gobion, the youngest of 5 children. Her father was killed while working as a night watchman, when a lorry hit his watchman's hut. Betty was only 4. Times were hard and the



family were very poor, managing to survive with the help of an allotment. Things began to get better when her mother married again but sadly, this man died 4 years later. In January 1940 her mother decided to move the family to a new house at Roade. On leaving school, Betty went to work for Sears (Trueform) shoe factory and worked there for 8 and a half years, after which she married Jack Higham. He worked all his life at Moulton Co – operative Society, finishing up as Secretary Manager.

They began their married life in Moulton in 2 rooms at first then they moved to Prince of Wales Row. After that it was to a newer house in Carey Close, then the Grove and finally to Tarrant Way. It was a good and happy marriage and lasted for 47 years until Jack died suddenly in 1996. There were 2 sons, Trevor and Kevin, and, in the course of time, 4 grandchildren, Samantha, Natalie, Gemma and Matthew and then 3 great-grandchildren, Noah, Lucy and Caleb.

Betty and Jack were devoted to each other and went everywhere together. She found Jack's death hard but kept going as best she could. She didn't drive so this was an added difficulty, but Betty Higham was a determined lady and she loved to socialise. She was a good dancer, loving ballroom dancing and she went to countless tea dances. She also went to weekly whist drives and keep fit classes. She was Treasurer for the Darby and Joan Club for 25 years and sold poppies door-to-door for 15 years.

The last years were difficult for Betty. Suddenly, feeling unable to cope at home, she went into a care home nearer her sons. She quietly passed away on 8th February this year and will be sadly missed.

Keith LANCHBURY. Keith was born in Nottingham in 1935, the only child of devoted parents, Cyril and Eva. He had a very happy loving childhood. He went to the local primary school and then on to Magnus Grammar School in Newark, which meant travelling 25 miles each way by train. This was no hardship as Keith had been a trainspotter since



he was 9 years old and trains were a very important part of his life. He represented his school at chess and was a member of the school cricket team, going on to join Nottinghamshire and playing for the Under 21s. Cricket could possibly have been his career, but his love of maths resulted in him serving Articles for 5 years to become a Chartered Accountant – a job he loved and equated with being a detective, only working with numbers rather than people.

In 1956 he met Jane at a dance and told his parents he had met the girl he was going to marry. They lived opposite ends of Nottingham, so Keith would cycle over early morning and then would travel by bus to and from Nottingham then cycle the 7 miles home at night. There was a very steep hill en route so Keith was delighted when, a year later, he bought a motorbike which made the journey easier. It was an AJS 500. They were married in 1958.

Due to work they had 6 homes in the first 7 years of their marriage. Firstly, Romford where Nigel was born, then Sheffield, where Philip was born then Nottingham, Edinburgh, St Neots and finally Moulton, where Deborah was born. Finding Holly Cottage was a dream come true and they loved both the cottage and the village of Moulton.

Keith served on the Parish Council for 20 years and was Auditor to the Parish Church and for Moulton Players. He also started a Badminton Group which met every Thursday evening at Moulton School. He was an enormous support to Jane, appearing as wine waiter at NSPCC events and welcoming at Macmillan fund-raisers.

In 1980 Keith set up a private practice, working from Holly Cottage. He loved the variety of his clients, many of whom became friends. One of his clients was the Rolls Royce Enthusiasts Club and when he retired, despite the fact that he drove a Honda, they made him an Honorary Life Member. Lin, his trusted secretary, was by his side for over 30 years. It was only when Lin retired that Keith also decided to retire. He was 82.

Keith loved reading but only non-fiction. Bradshaw, the Holy Bible for rail enthusiasts, was a feature of the bookshelves. Keith travelled the length and breadth of the country simply to ride on trains, always taking one or two of the children with him. He also enjoyed his allotment – rhubarb his speciality. Loving rhubarb was almost a rite of passage for membership of the Lanchbury family! His taste in music was eclectic – he loved bagpipes, big band music and musicals - his favourite being Seven Brides for Seven Brothers . He also loved cartoons of the Tom and Jerry type.

In 2012, returning from a holiday in the Channel Islands, Philip had a heart attack and died. This was devastating for the whole family. He was 50.

Keith and Jane were the total opposites of each other, but two halves of the same coin and they were very happily married for 65 years. So many of the cards received referred to him as a gentleman and he was, in both senses of the word. He was Grandpa to Chris, Jay, Matt, Charlie and Thomas and great grandpa to Jesse and Agatha (Aggie). He is much missed by all who knew him.

Pamela Aida NORRIS (known as Pam) the daughter of Joseph and Aida Herring, born in Edmonton North London on 9 May 1930. Pam grew up in a close neighbourhood with many of her family living in the same street or not far away.



Aged 9 years, Pam's first big adventure was forced upon her. The war came and her parents felt it was safest for her to travel to a farm near Reading in 1940; she joined her cousins there. Pam told wonderful stories of her time at the farm playing with her cousins, going to school with the other evacuees. She spoke of it as a happy time.

Following the war, Pam continued her life in Edmonton and chose to go to Pitman College to study typing and shorthand. Her first job was in central London, which was a long commute, and she soon took a job as typist with the local Gasworks in Tottenham. Here Pam formed many dear friendships that endured throughout her life. She often went dancing at the weekend or on holiday with these friends, and later in life continued to keep contact.

In 1951 Pam went on holiday with her parents and sister, Patricia, to the Sunshine Holiday camp at Hayling Island. Here she met Peter Norris, who was on leave from his work as a Policeman in Uganda. After Peter returned

to Uganda, Pam and Peter stayed in touch writing letters for the next 2.5 years. When on his next leave, Peter proposed, and they married on 27 December 1954. Shortly after the wedding, Pam was whisked on a trans-mediterranean steamer to Uganda with her new husband Peter. Both on the long ship journey to Uganda and her years of living there, Pam made great friendships that endured a lifetime.

Uganda proved to be a good period for the family, with Peter founding the railway police and Pam and Peter building a family - Paul, Helen and Philippa all being born there. In Uganda they spent a lot of time far from cities due to Peter's work and amazingly, Pam gave birth to and raised 3 children while there, often in challenging situations. To illustrate...when pregnant with Paul, he decided to make an appearance 6 weeks too early. Pam was loaded into a car to travel 160 miles in the blistering heat on dirt tracks to Kampala hospital. Typical of Pam, she didn't complain about this, or having to find her way without comforts, close family, or the other challenges of living life without the mod cons of life back home. On Uganda becoming independent under the rule of Idi Amin in 1963, the family could see a safer life ahead in the UK. Pam and Peter first settled in Endon in Staffordshire where Timothy was born in 1966.

There were further moves to Ballymena in Northern Ireland, then Hale in Cheshire and finally in 1981 to Moulton in Northamptonshire, where Pam lived the remaining 43 years of her life.

Pam's desire to help people endeared her to many and she made great connections wherever she was, often helping those in need of some support or simply kindness. Here in in the village, Pam spent around 30 years helping to run the Monday Club at the Carey Baptist church. Pam also helped at the Moulton Baby Clinic held in the Village Hall for many years, where she supported nurses and parents with whatever was needed along with other WI members. In later years, Pam often saw many of these babies walking to school with their parents as they grew up. She loved helping wherever people needed it, with no judgement and full of kindness.

West Northamptonshire Council Cabinet Member, Cllr Fiona Baker talks to us about the exciting development of Family Hubs and the recent launch of an online resource for families.

Family Hubs will offer a safe, welcoming space and central point of access for all families with children aged 0 to 19 years (or 25 years for a young person with a special educational need or disability).

At their heart, Family Hubs are about bringing everything together to help families get the right information and help when needed, giving babies a great start in life and supporting families through to adolescence.

Cllr Fiona Baker, Cabinet Member for Children, Families and Education at WNC said: "We are pleased to have launched the Family Hubs website which provides an online tool to support families and their children right from the start of planning their pregnancy, through to their teenage years. The dedicated website page provides practical guidance for children of all ages, as well as details of local services to support families.'

WNC are developing a network of "Family Hubs and Spokes" across the area; the main hubs will be in Towcester, Northampton and Daventry. The launch of the first in-person Family Hub is due to take place later this year in Towcester. WNC are working closely with local authorities and partners to look at how it can extend this in-person offer in local communities throughout West Northamptonshire, with the introduction of 'Spokes'. Spokes will offer a more localised service to families and provide a link to the main Hubs.

This fabulous initiative for West Northants is being delivered by Cllr Baker who has been working with Moulton Parish Council for some time. Cllr Baker adds "Moulton already provides excellent services for families and children, and we are excited to learn from them, and explore further opportunities to work together in the coming months."
